Overall Comments:

Mission and Catholic Identity

- 1. Upon entering the building, it is evident that Saint Thomas is a Catholic school. One experiences a warm welcome and a vibrant community full of activity. The school has happy and engaged students. Hallways and classrooms are filled with beautiful artworks and signs of faith.
- 2. The mission statement includes a commitment to the Catholic identity of the school and all constituents know and understand the mission. It is evident that the mission is alive and more than just words on paper. The school embraces diversity and makes continuous efforts to bring their mission to children in the surrounding areas through any means possible, such as speakers and retreats.

Governance and Leadership

- 3. There is evidence of a strong relationship between the parish and the school at all levels: Pastor/Principal, Board/Councils, and Parish and School staff, Parents/Parishioners/Students.
- 4. School leaders, teachers, and board members generously share best practices with other local schools and within the alliance of Catholic Schools. Of particular note is the focus on being an inclusive educational community, with a robust program for meeting the needs of all students.
- 5. Fr. Jim referred to school leadership establishing a positive atmosphere within the school. In many schools, this is referred to as "school culture." Regardless of its descriptor, Saint Thomas certainly has a strong Catholic school culture that begins with Catholic identity and reaches well into academics and extracurriculars.

Academic Excellence

- 6. Parents see the value of the school and parent groups recognize the efforts of the teaching staff and the administration and show their appreciation through gifts and social events.
- 7. Classroom instruction is designed to intentionally address the affective dimensions of learning, such as intellectual and social dispositions, relationship building, and habits of mind.
- 8. School wide and aggregated student data are normed to appropriate populations and are shared with all stakeholders.

Operational Vitality

- 9. The school has made intentional efforts to develop a marketing plan. Materials are visually appealing and communicated across a variety of mediums.
- 10. The school has a well-developed school facility improvement report. This careful and intentional planning is essential to the future of the school.
- 11. There is a commitment to operational vitality. The school leadership is looking at new ways to market itself and continues to investigate ways to diversify the school's funding sources.

Our Saint Thomas the Apostle Catholic School Board of Education meetings begin and end in prayers that ask to help us live our mission statement, providing a dynamic education centered in Christ. Our concluding prayer explicitly asks that the plans discussed be brought to life promoting our mission to and for our school community. Our leadership team is committed to bring this to our faculty/staff meetings as well. Our mission is displayed at the top of every faculty/staff meeting agenda.

To strengthen the foundation of our planning, we have created a mission effectiveness committee within the board to examine factors that contribute to our school's mission and vision: the direction of the GR Diocese, the focus of our parish, the competitive landscape we are in, societal trends, the impact of virtual learning while living out our mission, and the critical realities that impact our ministry.

Annually, the Saint Thomas the Apostle Catholic School administrative staff creates a State of the School report, detailing mission effectiveness by highlighting: data, financial information, MAP and PSAT comparisons, policy and planning, development and outreach and unique challenges we face in our school community. Our Principal meets with parents, faculty and staff to clarify, review and renew our commitment to our mission and vision. This transparency brings the community together and extends a multitude of opportunities for parent engagement and input.

Our school improvement process includes faculty bi-weekly meetings. Ideas and improvements from these meetings are presented to the Board of Education, which includes representatives from school parents and the greater community. The Board formally evaluates and approves goals that are aligned with our mission, vision and long-range plan.

In 2015-16, we formally evaluated and improved our mission statement. At that time, we determined that this statement reflected our living and vibrant faith that permeates all we are and all we do. We will review the mission again at the next strategic plan, scheduled for the fall of 2021.



At Saint Thomas the Apostle Catholic School, we utilize the Diocese of Grand Rapids religious education curriculum in conjunction with our Mission/Vision to guide our faith instruction. We create our religious curriculum using the Diocesan Anchor Standards, the principles of Catholic Social Teaching, current Catholic school practices, and best practices research from the Diocesan Curriculum Institute.

Some of our Saint Thomas school teachers assisted in reviewing and updating the Diocese religious education curriculum to ensure that our faith instruction is rooted in the Catechism of the Catholic Church. Through our religion courses, Saint Thomas students are invited to love and serve Christ, respect all people, value creation and serve others with a saintly passion.

At Saint Thomas the Apostle Catholic School, Religion classes are an integral part of our academic day, which includes a designated religion class in all grades. Our littlest learners (grades P3-3rd) visit the atrium for the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd Program. Kindergarten through 8th graders participate in Theology of the Body. Our 7th and 8th grade students focus on Dynamic Catholic's Decision Point, featuring Matthew Kelly. Our teachers are certified Catechists and trained in Theology of the Body. Other textbooks/resources that we use include:

- 1st grade Finding God and God's Gift, Exploring Faith through Art, Blessings
- 2nd grade Finding God and God's Gift, My Own Mass booklet, Blessings
- 3rd grade We Believe
- 4th grade Christ our Life
- 5th grade We Worship
- 6th grade God Calls a People and Spirit of Truth
- 7th grade Jesus, the Way, the Truth
- 8th grade Church: Then and Now, Confirmed in the Spirit

Saint Thomas the Apostle Catholic School faculty have catechist certificates, ranging from basic to Master catechists – with the exception of our two new 2020 hires (Grades 1 & Preschool 3) and our 5th grade teacher, who applied for certification in November 2020.

Our kindergarten teacher is a certified Master Catechist in Catechesis of the Good Shepherd and our preschool 4s teacher is an Advanced Catechist and teaches Level 1 and Level 2 to preschool $3s-3^{rd}$ grade Catechesis of the Good Shepherd. In addition, our Assistant Principal, who oversees the teaching staff and curriculum implementation, is a certified Master Catechist. We have an Atrium in the lower level of our Ministry Center and our students in grades P3 through third grade visit this space weekly to experience this hands-on religious education program.

At Saint Thomas the Apostle Catholic School, faith is first. It permeates and propels academics, extracurricular and conduct. We strive to teach our students the Scripture and the Sacraments in a way that leads them to a personal relationship with Jesus. Saint Thomas students participate in:

- Inclusive classes (preschool-Grade 8)
- Theology of the Body (K-Grade 8)
- Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (preschool-Grade 3)
- Service initiatives (preschool-Grade 8)
- Weekly Mass (Grades 1-8)
- Morning Chapel (K-Grade 8)
- Weekly adoration

Students are encouraged to raise questions about the Catholic faith and to actively seek answers. Teachers ask direct questions that lead students to explore their faith.

Supporting narrative

At Saint Thomas, we believe in the power of art and music to express our Catholic faith. Introducing our students to different visual, oral, and performing arts, opens their minds and hearts to the beauty of God's world.

Our school is bursting with visual art. Students, parents and any visitors to our school immediately see signs and symbols of our Catholic faith as they walk through the halls of our school – from our cross wall, depicting crosses from around the world, to the various visual and intentional art that hangs in the hallways, displaying Catholic social teachings, prayers, bible verses, architectural Christian symbols, positive affirmations, respect, dignity, friendship and love.

Our students have opportunities to cantor, play an instrument, and read at weekly school Masses. Over the last three years, students from grades 3-8 have auditioned for and performed an annual musical (Peter Pan Jr., Godspell Jr., Lion King Jr.). (Lion King postponed due to COVID.) In addition, many of our classrooms have dedicated prayer corners, while other teachers utilize inside/outside places with religious statues for student prayer and reflection.

Supporting narrative

At Saint Thomas, the theory and practice of the Church's social teachings are essential to our curriculum. Our students receive planned instruction in these teachings.

Our 7th and 8th graders participate in the annual Creating on the Margins contest, which includes writing about and designing an art piece that examines a specific social justice issue (such as racism, homelessness, etc.). Over the last three years, Saint Thomas students have been awarded in the top three places or honorable mentions. Our 7th graders also participate in an annual Leadership and Unity Retreat, where they create their class cross that hangs in the main hallway of school. Younger grades have similar retreats where they have made class quilts, performed the last supper, Thanksgiving plays, All Saints, and Mother's Day parades and songs. In addition, our students write about "A Saint I Know," where they describe a person they know who displays virtuous characteristics.

Our students participate in various service projects throughout the year, incorporating Catholic social teaching lessons:

- Our kindergartners rake leaves for Saint Thomas neighbors in need.
- Our 0-5 programs include Intergenerational Lap Time, teaching our littlest learners to respect life at all stages.
- Our older students serve as reading buddies and Mass buddies for our younger students.
- As a school community, we participate in Christmas service projects (Knight's Table/Children's Healing Center).
- Our multi-agers shared a bi-weekly lunch with our Holland Home senior neighbors in a lesson for the ages
- Staff deliver food and blankets to homeless people in Grand Rapids.

At Saint Thomas the Apostle Catholic School, our students learn and can lead a variety of forms of prayer. Students are involved in designing prayer services and regularly serve in a variety of roles in liturgy. Liturgy is celebrated weekly as a school or class community.

Our students have opportunities to cantor, play an instrument, and/or read at weekly Mass. Classes attend weekly adoration. Several of our students serve as altar servers (before COVID). Classrooms are built to have prayers corners or places for students to reflect. All classes learn and recite Catholic prayers – as a class and as a school. At Saint Thomas, our students learn that prayer is not just something we do – it is who we are.

At Saint Thomas the Apostle Catholic School, students are offered timely, regular and age-appropriate opportunities to reflect on their life experiences and faith through retreats, Chapel reflection, Catechesis of the Good Shepherd, and other spiritual experiences. As a school community, we begin each day with Chapel, during which we specifically ask our students to "take a moment of silence to dedicate your day to God and treasure our dynamic education centered in Christ." In addition, we end each day praying as a school community – often with the Examination of Conscience, asking students to reflect on their day. Several teachers schedule weekly Adoration in the church for their students.

Our students also attend regular retreats. Our 2nd graders attend a First Communion retreat, our 4th graders a First Reconciliation retreat, our 7th graders a Leadership retreat and our 8th graders a Confirmation retreat. During all of these retreats and others, students have opportunities to participate in guided reflection on their faith and life experiences.

Supporting narrative

At Saint Thomas the Apostle Catholic School, we value service. Servant leadership is one of the promises we make to our school families. Our website states, "From the very first days of preschool through the last days of 8th grade, Saint Thomas students learn to care for others, to seek leadership opportunities, and to provide service to others." We incorporate service learning into our school days, using Gospel values and Catholic faith as rationale for engaging in service.

Our preschoolers collect canned goods for God's Kitchen during Thanksgiving. Our kindergartners rake leaves for Saint Thomas neighbors in need. Our 1st-2nd graders adopt a family to collect food and gifts for at Christmas. Our 3rd graders learn about a Lenten Service Water Project. Our 4th and 5th graders give of their time to help clean up our Habitat. Our middle school students give up their recess to make blankets for the homeless. Our entire school participated in events to collect food for Kids' Food Basket (local), to collect diapers for HELP Pregnancy (local), to collect art supplies for ACT – Artists Creating Together (local) and to collect funds for Catholic Relief Services to help Haiti (global). In 2019 during our Do Good December Advent Project, the entire school made cards for Holland Home Raybrook residents and we adopted families from King's Table for gift giving and necessary essentials. Our students learn to make service a part of their lives.

Saint Thomas the Apostle Catholic School students experience fully from everyone who serves as role models of faith and service for social justice. Our Saint Thomas administrators, teachers, and staff hold various liturgical, board, and committee positions in their home parishes.

This commitment to our Catholic faith begins in the interview process. We ask prospective employees questions about how their faith life is nurtured and sustained. Several of our teaching staff call Saint Thomas parish their home, while others are active in their home parishes throughout the diocese.

Our Saint Thomas leadership team provides retreats and other spiritual experiences for the faculty regularly. The preparation for the school year begins with a day-long faculty retreat, which includes prayer, planning team-building experiences, and Mass. The leadership team and faculty celebrate Mass together on the last Thursday of each month during the school year. As a school community, we lift each other up in prayer with our "Faculty/Staff Prayer Partners" program

Bi-weekly faculty and school improvement meetings begin and end in prayer. Fr. Jim Chelich attends these faculty and staff meetings prior to the Advent and Lent seasons to share his most recent writings and converse with our faculty on the teachings of the church.

At Saint Thomas the Apostle Catholic School, we know that parents are the primary educators of their children. Our leadership team and faculty strive to assist parents in nurturing their children's faith as well as their own. This past spring (2020), we gave a Theology of the Body book to all parents so that they may better understand and gain insight into the substance of our religion curriculum here at Saint Thomas.

We communicate to our parents the various workshops or seminars that could support them in raising healthy, joyful, and faithful children of the light. This year, one of the blessings of COVID came in an idea to match each school family with their own prayer partner family – we could all use a little extra prayer this year in particular! We feature speakers, movies, and presentations on things we believe empower our partnership with our parents. For example,

- Love and Logic Parenting
- Boys and Girls Learn Differently
- Angst Movie Presentation and Discussion Panel
- MAP of Life weekly virtual teachings by Fr. Jim
- Protect Young Eyes
- Vocations Awareness
- Celebrate Life

Parents are our valued partners in the education of their children. They create the atmosphere for which Saint Thomas is known. Their faith and actions support what we stand for as a school community.

Saint Thomas the Apostle School leadership team, teachers, and staff collaborate with several other institutions to provide opportunities for parents to grow in knowledge of the greater Grand Rapids community needs. These experiences allow our families to participate in service to bring about change for the better and make a difference in our world. They also provide real life opportunities that help both families and their students learn that these small acts of kindness can help them grow in their faith and knowledge of needs beyond their own.

During this past Advent season, Saint Thomas shared their light with each other by participating in an all school family prayer partner event. We spread our light by adopting three families through King's Table, a nonprofit dedicated to serving individuals and families impacted by developmental and intellectual disabilities. We shined the light by creating and delivering more than 250 cards to our Holland Home Raybrook senior neighbors. We lived the light by supporting local Saint Thomas family businesses over the holiday season.

We strive to partner with our community to bring other opportunities to our students. We welcome Aquinas students as student teachers, aftercare helpers, and volunteer tutors. Holland Home Raybrook is where we have provided intergenerational activities for children ages 0-100. We partner with Children's Healing Center, a first-of-its-kind recreational center for kids with weak immune systems. Our neighborhood and the Eastown community are willing and watchful supporters of what we do at Saint Thomas as we develop conscientious and honorable future community leaders.

Parents in the Saint Thomas the Apostle Catholic School community are invited to participate in Christian service programs and participation is the norm. Our 0-5 programs include Intergenerational Lap Time with our Holland Home senior friends. This program has drawn many of our families with young children. Lots of parents participate annually in our "Giving Tuesday," which has supported Children's Healing Center and Artists Creating Together and Kids' Food Basket. Our annual "Rumble with the Rams" event, which benefits Special Olympics. In addition, we make parents aware of Saint Thomas Parish's Christian service events by including information in our weekly newsletter "The Buzz," and our social media.

During the 2020 Advent season, we had our "Do Good December" event. Saint Thomas families participated in an all school family prayer partner event. We adopted and purchased gifts for three families through King's Table, a nonprofit dedicated to serving individuals and families impacted by developmental and intellectual disabilities. We delivered more than 250 cards to our Holland Home Raybrook senior neighbors. We supported local Saint Thomas family businesses over the holiday season. All parents and families were invited to participate in these social justice activities.

Parents are our valued partners in educating their children. They create the atmosphere for which we are known. Their faith supports the rich Christ-centered learning. Their actions reinforce what we stand for as a school community. They are the primary educators of their children.



The Saint Thomas the Apostle Catholic School Board of Education, principal and assistant principal engage in a well-defined financial planning process in collaboration with Nienhuis Financial Group LLC, certified CPAs with more than 20 years of experience working with non-profit management and funding. We also collaborate with Finance Council members who are licensed CPAs. We begin this process with projection data and a preliminary budget that is revised through input from the administration, Board of Education, Technology Director, Athletic Director, and Auction Chair.

The leadership team works closely with the Pastor to assure that the school budget reflects a commitment to a healthy parish, taking no more than 35 percent of the parish offertory.

In December, we present the draft budget to our Board of Education for review and input and to establish tuition rates. In January, the Finance Council approves the proposed tuition rates. We revise the budget with input from each of the budget's expense areas: School Administrative expenses, Elementary School expenses, After School and Enrichment revenue/expense, School Lunch revenue/expense, Athletics revenue/expense, Plant expense, Home and School budget, and Technology budget. As enrollment is secured in the Spring, we revise the budget to reflect the known income. In April, we present the most current draft to the Board of Education and Finance Council for final approval and then submit it to the Diocese of Grand Rapids.

The Educational Foundation commits to an amount for the school operating budget and tuition assistance prior to April, after consulting with the principal, the Board of Education and the Finance Council to determine need. The Board of Education and leadership team work closely with the Education Foundation, an entity separate from the school and parish tasked with providing operating expenses and tuition assistance to Saint Thomas the Apostle Catholic School through grants from the Foundation's investments.

Saint Thomas the Apostle Catholic School is part of the larger Saint Thomas community, which includes Saint Thomas the Apostle Parish and the Saint Thomas Education Foundation. We are grateful for the support of our entire community to inspire the faith lives of our children. Our school financial plans include agreed-upon levels of financial investment determined by our Parish pastor, the Saint Thomas Education Foundation, our leadership team, the Executive Committee and the Finance Council.

In creating our financial plans, we consider a diverse set of funding sources such as tuition revenue, Education Foundation scholarships, Tuition Angel Grant scholarships, Diocesan scholarships, registration fees, school donations, subsidies from other parishes, grants, and fundraising. Our school families sign a tuition commitment form as written agreement of their tuition and registration fees. The Diocese sends updates to confirm scholarships given to Saint Thomas the Apostle Catholic School students as well as the Bishops scholarships awarded to our students. The Education Foundation commits in writing the amount of scholarship money pledged to the school. Our Parish Finance Coordinator maintains contact with all funding sources to assure that commitments are made in a timely and predicted manner.

Saint Thomas the Apostle Catholic School financial plan defines revenue sources that include tuition assistance, Diocesan and Education Foundation scholarships, endowment funds, financial gifts designated for school use, assistance from Tuition Angel fund gifts, a bi-annual major fundraiser, grant funding, support from other parishes without schools, and income from programming such as preschool or kindergarten enrichment program. We also partner with the Red Glasses Movement to support our Education Support Services. The Finance Coordinator regularly tracks the history of these sources.

Our financial plans are routinely reviewed by the pastor, leadership team, Board of Education Finance committee chair, Board of Education as a whole, and the Finance Council. Every year, State of the School meetings are held as accountability and transparency measures to our families. At these meetings, the leadership team highlights the budget and means of arriving at tuition rates for the upcoming year.

In addition, we have visited Blue Ribbon schools and highly successful Catholic schools in other states to benchmark our financial and operational practices.

Our Saint Thomas the Apostle Catholic School financial plans include all the costs associated with the school, including costs that we share with the parish. The finance coordinator and the principal agree on the allocation of costs such as plant expenses and shared personnel. We give every expenditure on our budget a line item with an account number from our chart of accounts.

We generate reports on a monthly basis, both detailed and aggregate for monitoring budget vs. actual. We also project out a five-year capital expenditure budget to assure that we are anticipating large expenses and incorporating those into the appropriate budgets. We do cost analysis for cost per student, hot lunch and plant costs. To make sure that more than one person documents and checks accounting and handling of money, we follow a documented internal control procedure. The Finance Council reviews budgets, projections and financial statements, as well as monitors the health of the fund balance. Our Executive team (which consists of the Pastoral Council President, Finance Council President, Parish Life Coordinator, Board of Education President, Education Foundation President, and Principal and Pastor) regularly meets with the Board of Education and the Finance Council regularly review this information.

All extra programming, such as preschool and kindergarten enrichment and after-school enrichment opportunities, are self-funded and do not require parish contribution money. The cost to educate each child at Saint Thomas is an important factor in setting the budget, as well as for adding programming or expenses each year. We calculate these figures based on all costs, including those shared by the parish and any capital expenses and maintenance. We consider cost per student in the overall financial health of our school and parish. Every year, we proactively share the breakdown of cost per child in the total proposed budget through our State of School meetings and throughout the channels of Board of Education and Finance Council. We consider all feedback and, if necessary, address concerns in budget revisions.

Money should never prevent a child from attending a Catholic school. We strive to make sure that any family who wants to send their child to Saint Thomas the Apostle Catholic School can do so.

We use several communication avenues to make sure that families know of available financial assistance. Early in the school year, we encourage all families fill out and submit the SMART Aid tuition form, whether or not they need financial assistance. We link to the online form on our website and in our weekly newsletters and post reminders to our social media sites. In addition, we send out an email to all families, explaining the process and linking to the SMART Aid online form.

In the spring, we evaluate all sources of tuition assistance including our Education Foundation, Angel Tuition Fund, the Bishops Scholarship and other possible sources unique to the year. In addition, the principal addresses the parish after every Mass during Catholic Schools Week about an extra gift to the Angel Tuition Fund, and students speak as well to thank the parish for their support. Our bi-annual school and parish auction includes an Angel Tuition appeal that nets a significant amount of support dollars dedicated to assisting families with a Catholic education. A parent or student who receives tuition assistance speaks at the auction, creating a personal connection and awareness of the importance of this fund to families.

We make sure that there is accountability built in to our financial practices. The governing body and school leadership team, along with the finance coordinator, have a mature process for financial planning and long-term planning for capital expenditures. We document the planning process, which has a regular rhythm throughout the year. Every month, the leadership team and governing body receive a Statement of Activities that accounts for all spending, compared to the last year, and as a percentage of the annual budget. We present this to the Board of Education and Finance Council on a monthly basis as an accountability measure for the principal and as a means of monitoring the stewardship of resources. The Board of Education and Finance Council also receive the General Ledger for those expenditures with all journal entries for the month. This, too, demonstrates transparency in reporting, as well as a means of monitoring stewardship.
